
Tenth Sunday after Pentecost

A Reading from Hebrew Scripture

Jeremiah 23:23-29

An Introduction:

In our first reading God speaks through the prophet: this is a God lofty and distant as well as near, and God knows the lies of the false prophets. In Jeremiah's time there were many individuals who appointed themselves prophets. They said the Lord was close to them, and they relied on dreams for their inspiration. They told people the comfortable things they wanted to hear and led them into false worship. But the words of the Lord are words of judgment to the people, like scorching fire or a hammer on rock.

Lector: A reading from the Book of Jeremiah.

Am I a God near by, says the LORD, and not a God far off? Who can hide in secret places so that I cannot see them? says the LORD. Do I not fill heaven and earth? says the LORD. I have heard what the prophets have said who prophesy lies in my name, saying, "I have dreamed, I have dreamed!" How long? Will the hearts of the prophets ever turn back-- those who prophesy lies, and who prophesy the deceit of their own heart? They plan to make my people forget my name by their dreams that they tell one another, just as their ancestors forgot my name for Baal. Let the prophet who has a dream tell the dream, but let the one who has my word speak my word faithfully. What has straw in common with wheat? says the LORD. Is not my word like fire, says the LORD, and like a hammer that breaks a rock in pieces?

After the Reading

Lector: Hear what the Spirit is saying to the Church.

People: Thanks be to God.

Psalm 82 Deus stetit

God pronounces judgment on the heavenly beings who have failed to defend the weak and the poor. The people call on the one true God to judge and rule the earth.

- 1 God takes his stand in the council of heaven; * he gives judgment in the midst of the gods:
- 2 "How long will you judge unjustly, * and show favor to the wicked?
- 3 Save the weak and the orphan; * defend the humble and needy;
- 4 Rescue the weak and the poor; * deliver them from the power of the wicked.
- 5 They do not know, neither do they understand; they go about in darkness; * all the foundations of the earth are shaken.
- 6 Now I say to you, 'You are gods, *
 and all of you children of the Most High;
- 7 Nevertheless, you shall die like mortals, * and fall like any prince.'"
- 8 Arise, O God, and rule the earth, * for you shall take all nations for your own.

The Epistle Lesson Hebrews 11:29-12:2

An Introduction:

In this New Testament lesson Jesus the promised one has opened access to the Father in ways previous generations longed to see. The righteous men and women of former days performed all their deeds in faith, true to God and to such revelation as they had received. Now disciples are to set aside distractions and surmount every obstacle, encouraged by the witness of the faithful ancestors and walking confidently in the way forged by Jesus through the sacrifice of the cross.

Lector: A reading from the Book of Hebrews.

By faith the people passed through the Red Sea as if it were dry land, but when the Egyptians attempted to do so they were drowned. By faith the walls of Jericho fell after they had been encircled for seven days. By faith Rahab the prostitute did not perish with those who were disobedient, because she had received the spies in peace.

And what more should I say? For time would fail me to tell of Gideon, Barak, Samson, Jephthah, of David and Samuel and the prophets-- who through faith conquered kingdoms, administered justice, obtained promises, shut the mouths of lions, quenched raging fire, escaped the edge of the sword, won strength out of weakness, became mighty in war, put foreign armies to flight. Women received their dead by resurrection. Others were tortured, refusing to accept release, in order to obtain a better resurrection. Others suffered mocking and flogging, and even chains and imprisonment. They were stoned to death, they were sawn in two, they were killed by the sword; they went about in skins of sheep and goats, destitute, persecuted, tormented-- of whom the world was not worthy. They wandered in deserts and mountains, and in caves and holes in the ground.

Yet all these, though they were commended for their faith, did not receive what was promised, since God had provided something better so that they would not, apart from us, be made perfect.

Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight and the sin that clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer

and perfecter of our faith, who for the sake of the joy that was set before him endured the cross, disregarding its shame, and has taken his seat at the right hand of the throne of God.

People: Thanks be to God.

The Gospel St. Luke 12:49-56

Gospeler: The Holy Gospel of our Lord + Jesus Christ according to St. + Luke.

People: Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus said, "I came to bring fire to the earth, and how I wish it were already kindled! I have a baptism with which to be baptized, and what stress I am under until it is completed! Do you think that I have come to bring peace to the earth? No, I tell you, but rather division! From now on five in one household will be divided, three against two and two against three; they will be divided:

father against son
and son against father,
mother against daughter
and daughter against mother,
mother-in-law against her daughter-in-law
and daughter-in-law against mother-in-law."

He also said to the crowds, "When you see a cloud rising in the west, you immediately say, 'It is going to rain'; and so it happens. And when you see the south wind blowing, you say, 'There will be scorching heat'; and it happens. You hypocrites! You know how to interpret the appearance of earth and sky, but why do you not know how to interpret the present time?"



Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with St. Paul and all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom. All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ. By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and forever. *Amen.* +

Receiving Holy Communion

- **Children:** All children are invited to the Communion Rail to receive a blessing. Those who have been baptized are welcome to receive the Sacrament at parental discretion.
- **Baptized Adults:** All baptized Christians are invited to receive the Sacrament as personal conscience permits. Those who do not wish to receive may cross their arms over their chests to receive a blessing.
- **How?** The Priest will instinct a Host and place it upon your tongue. If intinction is not desired, extend your hands (tradition places the right palm over the left) to receive the Host (the Sacrament is valid in one kind...the Host alone.) The Priest will otherwise intinct a Host and place it upon your tongue. For reasons of hygiene, we are not presently sharing a common Chalice, nor encouraging intinction by individuals, (which often sees finger digits, potentially unhygienically, immerse in the Chalice.
- **Physically limited?** If you are unable to walk to Communion, speak to an Usher, and the Sacrament will be brought to you in your pew.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

WELCOME TO VISITORS! Whether residing or visiting in San Miguel, we welcome you to St. Paul's and to full participation in worship. An envelope is available for the provision of contact information should you so desire. Christians from every tradition are invited to receive the Sacrament of the Altar. Please join us for coffee following.

Commencing Sunday August 31, next Sunday, St. Paul's will re-introduce the Common Chalice at all celebrations of the Holy Eucharist. The teaching of the Book of Common Prayer is that the normative method for receiving Holy Communion is to eat the Consecrated Bread and to drink the Consecrated Wine, and that there must be weighty reason for any other practice. During the early years of COVID there was much uncertainty regarding how COVID and SARS-CoV-2 might be communicated, and, in prayerful prudence, we implemented Holy Communion in one kind (the Host) or with the intinction of the Host by the Priest, placing the Host on the communicant's tongue.

Studies have shown any pathogen on the lip of a silver chalice containing alcohol of 14.5% to be nearly indetectable, especially when the chalice is rotated and wiped with a purificator.

Self-intinction is the least sanitary method of receiving Holy Communion and is not practiced at St. Paul's.

Beginning August 31, there will be 3 options for receiving Holy Communion:

- 1. The Host may be received in the palm of the recipient's hand and consumed in one kind. This is an historically valid method of reception as the Blood of Christ inheres in the Body of Christ.
- 2. The Host may be received in the palm of the recipient's hand and elevated tor the Priest to intinct the Host and place it upon the communicant's tongue.
- 3. As in days of yore, the communicant may receive the Host, and then sip the Blood of Christ from the Chalice offered by the Chalice-Bearer.

Under no circumstances will self-intinction be permitted.

BLESSING OF THE ANIMALS: Saturday October 4 at 5 o'clock in the evening the clergy will preside a non-Eucharistic Evening Prayer and Blessing of the Animals on the front lawn.
